

Be aware, these men are on call and Stanley Contracting has to pay them for going on that service call. If the call can wait until the next business day, we suggest that you call back then. If you have a medical emergency, you should call 911. If you need a maintenance person to come right away, then by all means dispatch someone, just be aware that we will send a bill for \$65.00. Please also note that this charge is paid to Stanly Contracting, the company that the maintenance men report to. The money does not get paid to Village 7. If you have any questions regarding this process, please don't hesitate to call the office at 732-350-2882.



Dear Residents of Village 7

Please be advised that the litigation that should have ended in February 2024, after the election, is still

on going. Michael Kane, Diane Omilanowitz, Barbara Zeh and Maureen Caswell along with their lawyer, Paul Leodori, are now trying to shut down the Clubhouse food pantry during the holiday season.

The plaintiffs claim "Accordingly, Derivative Action Claimants request that Whiting Village immediately confirm in writing to me that the food pantry running in the name of Whiting Village in violation of the Governing Documents and New Jersey and federal law immediately cease."

This request is distasteful and cruel. The above 4 plaintiffs and their lawyer would rather see their neighbors go without food at the neediest time of the year.

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SNOW REMOVAL GUIDELINES DO NOT CALL THE OFFICE FOR PLOWING PROGRESS!

Below is a reminder of the procedures that all residents in Crestwood Village VII must adhere to during snow events.

- Generally, snow removal will not begin until the snow has stopped falling.
- Plowing will not start until snow accumulation has reached three (3) inches.
- The main roads will be plowed first.
- Resident's that are on the priority plowing list (for priority list information, see below) will have their driveways completed as the main roads are being plowed.
- Driveways and finger streets will be plowed when main roads and priority plowing is completed.
- If your car is parked in your driveway at the time the plow comes along, your driveway will not be plowed. If you go out and move your car, the plows will not return.
- The Resident is responsible for any snow remaining on the driveway after it has been plowed, this includes blowing or drifting snow.
- Cars that are left on the street or finger street during a snowstorm may be towed, at the owner's expense, so that the streets can be adequately plowed.
- Salting of roads will be based on conditions/ temperature and at the discretion of the Trustees.

As with any other situation, if you have a medical emergency during a storm, do not call the Association office to be plowed out, please call 911.

PLEASE DO NOT CALL THE ANSWERING SERVICE AFTER HOURS BECAUSE YOU HAVE NOT BEEN PLOWED. THE ANSWERING SERVICE CANNOT PROVIDE ANY INFORMATION AND CANNOT DISPATCH THE PLOWS. YOU CAN CALL THE VILLAGE HOTLINE FOR UPDATES AT 732-350-4358.

NON EMERGENCY CALLS MADE TO THE AFTER HOURS ANSWERING SERVICE MAY BE CHARGED BACK TO THE RESIDENT.

If you are receiving Dialysis or other Life Saving treatments that require you to go to a treatment facility despite the weather, please submit the Emergency Snow Removal form and a doctor's note to the office so you can be added to the priority list.



Isn't that fun? It looks so pretty in person and really adds charm to any indoor holiday decor. Winter craft projects are the best as you can involve the entire family and prepare together for the jolliest time of the year. So if you're looking for a new winter decor this idea, make a fish bowl snowman. The nicest part is that you can build a small Christmas scenery in each bowl and then stack one on top of the other, creating an entire story. Don't forget to ask for help from your friends or family!

History of Hanukkah

The events that inspired the Hanukkah holiday took place during a particularly turbulent phase of Jewish history. Around 200 B.C., Judea—also known as the Land of Israel—came under the control of Antiochus III, the Seleucid king of Syria, who allowed the Jews who lived there to continue practicing their religion. His son, Antiochus IV Epiphanes, proved less benevolent: Ancient sources recount that he outlawed the Jewish religion and ordered the Jews to worship Greek gods. In 168 B.C., his soldiers descended upon Jerusalem, massacring thousands of people and desecrating the city's holy Second Temple by erecting an altar to Zeus and sacrificing pigs within its sacred walls.

Did you know? The story of Hanukkah does not appear in the Torah because the events that inspired the holiday occurred after it was written. It is, however, mentioned in the New Testament, in which Jesus attends a "Feast of Dedication."

Led by the Jewish priest Mattathias and his five sons, a large-scale rebellion broke out against Antiochus and the Seleucid monarchy. When Matthathias died in 166 B.C., his son Judah, known as Judah Maccabee ("the Hammer"), took the helm; within two years the Jews had successfully driven the Syrians out of Jerusalem, relying largely on guerilla warfare tactics. Judah called on his followers to cleanse the Second Temple, rebuild its altar and light its menorah—the gold candelabrum whose seven branches represented knowledge and creation and were meant to be kept burning every night.

The Hanukkah 'Miracle'

According to the Talmud, one of Judaism's most central texts, Judah Maccabee and the other Jews who took part in the rededication of the Second Temple witnessed what they believed to be a miracle. Even though there was only enough untainted olive oil to keep the menorah's candles burning for a single day, the flames continued flickering for eight nights, leaving them time to find a fresh supply. This wondrous event inspired the Jewish sages to proclaim a yearly eight-day festival. (The first Book of the Maccabees tells another version of the story, describing an eight-day celebration that followed the rededication but making no reference to the miracle of the oil.)

Other Interpretations of the Hanukkah Story

Some modern historians offer a radically different interpretation of the Hanukkah tale. In their view, Jerusalem under Antiochus IV had erupted into civil war between two camps of Jews: those who had assimilated into the dominant culture that surrounded them, adopting Greek and Syrian customs; and those who were determined to impose Jewish laws and traditions, even if by force. The traditionalists won out in the end, with the Hasmonean dynasty—led by Judah Maccabee's brother and his descendants—wresting control of the Land of Israel from the Seleucids and maintaining an independent Jewish kingdom for more than a century.

Jewish scholars have also suggested that the first Hanukkah may have been a belated celebration of Sukkot, which the Jews had not had the chance to observe during the Maccabean Revolt. One of the Jewish religion's most important holidays, Sukkot consists of seven days of feasting, prayer and festivities.

Hanukkah Decorations and Traditions

The Hanukkah celebration revolves around the kindling of a nine-branched menorah, known in Hebrew as the hanukiah. On each of the holiday's eight nights, another candle is added to the menorah after sundown; the ninth candle, called the shamash ("helper"), is used to light the others. Jews typically recite blessings during this ritual and display the menorah prominently in a window as a reminder to others of the miracle that inspired the holiday.

In another allusion to the Hanukkah miracle, traditional Hanukkah foods are fried in oil. Potato pancakes (known as latkes) and jam-filled donuts (sufganiyot) are particularly popular in many Jewish households. Other Hanukkah customs include playing with four-sided spinning tops called dreidels and exchanging gifts. In recent decades, particularly in North America, Hanukkah has exploded into a major commercial phenomenon, largely because it falls near or overlaps with <u>Christmas</u>. From a religious perspective, however, it remains a relatively minor holiday that places no restrictions on working, attending school or other activities.

It is time to prepare your medical necessity form. Our medical necessity application is designed to obtain information to help us provide services needed. The most common medical necessities are dialysis and chemo/radiation treatments as well as Registered Nurses.

While we are aware that many of our residents have medical conditions and needs, we simply cannot put everyone on a priority list. Eligible residents are those with life sustaining appointments during a snow event. The form requires the days and times of your treatment to help us prepare for your special needs.

Please note, a NEW FORM IS REQUIRED EACH YEAR.
